- Mrs. Tucker and Tom Davis, RPHF Solid Waste Manager, will be traveling to Lawrence and Scioto Counties tomorrow to discuss surveillance cameras each county uses to address illegal dumping at recycling collection bin sites. Conversations have been held with Administrative Lt. James Brown of the Pickaway County Sheriff’s Office (PCSO) regarding a reserve member of the Pickaway County Sheriff Office being utilized to monitor the live-stream cameras and follow-up on prosecuting offenders. The concept of the reserve member working in more than one county is being explored.
- Snap Fitness located on North Court Street has agreed to 3 recycling bins being placed behind its building. The site at the former Circleville Oil gas station site in downtown Circleville is still considered an option.
- Related to the county office paper recycling program, a total of 8,120 lbs. of paper was collected throughout the various offices during the period of March – August 2016.
- The RPHF office is preparing the district’s plan to be submitted to the Ohio EPA. An email has been distributed regarding the upcoming RPHF Policy Board meeting that is scheduled to be held in October.

Appalachia Ohio Alliance Land Conservancy Update
Related to Clean Ohio Funds Projects:

Steve Fleegal, Steve Goodwin, along with Al Altfater and Seth Rankin of the Appalachia Ohio Alliance (AOA) Land Conservancy, met with the commissioners to provide an update regarding the Clean Ohio Funds projects that have been previously approved. Terry Frazier, Director of the Pickaway County Development & Planning Office, was also in attendance.

Mr. Fleegal reported that the Scioto River Flyway Open House and Dedication that was held in June was a success and very well attended related to the Marsha Gunder Schneider Preserve. All properties have been closed that the commissioners previously approved that AOA applied for that includes the Cossin, Steward, Cline, and Kriesel properties. Approximately 600 acres have been purchased with Clean Ohio Funds, and an approximately the same amount of farmland have agricultural easements. AOA is currently working on the Arnold Gabriel agricultural easements that the commissioners approved in April of this year. Mr. Fleegal mentioned that other farmland owners are interested in the agricultural purchase easement program as well. It was requested that the commissioners' office be contacted in advance of landowners that may be coming before them for approval.

Mr. Fleegal also mentioned that AOA will be coming back before the commissioners with Clean Ohio Fund projects that will be due to the District 17 Natural Resources Assistance Council (NRAC) Funding Round 11 on September 30th. This will include 2 or 3 projects and some brief information was provided regarding them.

It was also mentioned that AOA will be making application for Local Sponsor Certification to administer the farmland preservation program for the multi-county region that includes Franklin, Pickaway,

Ross, and Hocking Counties. The application is due in October. Mr. Goodwin stated that the applications for individual farmland preservation projects will be due in April 2017.

Increase Previously Approved by the District Advisory Council:

Following the commissioners' discussion regarding the Pickaway Township Trustee's Association meeting schedule for later in the evening, which will be followed by a District Advisory Council (DAC) meeting, Commissioner Stewart offered the motion, seconded by Commissioner Wippel, to vote to support rescinding the DAC's \$47,500 budget increase to the Pickaway County Health General Health District that was previously approved for a health department accreditation officer position. General health districts must be accredited by July 1, 2020, in order to be eligible to receive funding from the Ohio Department of Health.

After Circleville City Council voted to withdraw from the DAC earlier this year related to the DAC funding formula, the city subsequently decided to remain as part of the DAC for one more year, and plan to propose putting a levy on the May 2017 ballot in order to raise the additional funds required by the health department. The health department has received a \$15,000 grant to go toward the accreditation officer.

Review of August Revenue & Expenditure
Reports with County Auditor:

Melissa Betz, County Auditor, reviewed the county's revenue and expenditure reports for period ending August 31st. The end of the month balance was \$6,494,732.35, and the balance for the day was \$6,410,268.74. No areas of concern were noted.

Mrs. Betz also spoke about a webinar that she, the county engineer, and county recorder participated in regarding the new e-recording (electronic document recording) process, a new option that will be available September 19th, that can transmit and electronically file real property documents. She explained that there is no cost to the county and the party that chooses to use e-recording pays a fee to the host website vendor that sends the documents to the county recorder's office which begins the process by sending it to the county engineering department for conveyance standards and then to the county auditor's office for conveyance, and ultimately back to the recorder's office. Recorded documents are returned electronically immediately after recording. County auditor and recorder offices fees that are collected are paid into the county's funds. E-recording automates document examination, fee collection, image retention, and data processing. Mr. Betz stated that if a document is rejected, the process begins all over again. Title companies, financial institutions, law firms and other businesses involved in real estate transactions recognize great benefits from electronic recording as it eliminates the need to physically take the documents to the various offices, though that option remains available. Mrs. Betz stated that she is not sure of the cost for each document.

Related to other topics, Mrs. Betz reported that county's online checkbook on the State Treasurer's Office will go live later today. A liaison from the State Treasurer's office will be making an announcement at the Pickaway County Township Trustee's Association meeting scheduled for later in the evening.

When the question was raised if the county auditor's association has any new information about the Managed Care Organization (MCO) state and county sales tax that will be ceasing effective July 1, 2017, Mrs. Betz reported that the only thing the association discussed at a recent county auditor's executive legislative meeting was the amount of sales tax that the state will be losing is similar to the amount of homestead roll-backs that counties receive for real estate taxes. She stated that may be a fix for the state in loss sales tax revenues, but not for counties.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the commissioners thanked Mrs. Betz for the review.

Discussion Regarding Miscellaneous Matters:

- Ms. Dengler reported that when an inquiry was made by Common Pleas regarding when remodeling will be done in the courtroom related to damage that occurred due to the roof leak that has since been

repaired, the department was informed that the project is part of the county's 2017 Capital Plan. The maintenance supervisor is speaking with the department regarding quotes that will be obtained.

- Ms. Dengler stated that it was reported that there is pigeon feces that needs to be removed in the courthouse parking lot.
- Extra chairs that are on hand will be provided to Juvenile/Probate Judge Long who indicated that he was short one in his office following the remodeling project in his department.
- Ms. Dengler reported that Lt. Mosely of the Sheriff's Office Court Services Department in the courthouse informed her that the two 14-year old hand-held metal detectors need replaced at a cost of approximately \$200 each. Ms. Dengler stated that after speaking with the county administrator regarding the matter, she informed Lt. Mosely that he said the new metal detectors can be replaced with sheriff department funds.
- A spreadsheet was reviewed that was prepared by the county administrator related to the increase in healthcare benefits for 2017. There is a 13% increase for the single plan and an 11.9% increase for the family plan. There will be no changes to the actual healthcare plan.

Meeting with Penny Dehner Regarding the New Paint Valley
Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Districtwide Levy:

Penny Dehner, Paint Valley Alcohol, Drug Addiction, and Mental Health Services (ADAMH) Board Associate Director, met with the commissioners distribute information and discuss the new 1 mill district-wide levy that will be on the Fayette, Highland, Pickaway, Pike and Ross Counties' November 2016 ballots. The ADAMH mission is, "*To positively impact our community by supporting mental health and recovery.*" The Paint Valley ADAMH Board is a 14-member board, with 6 members appointed by the Ohio Department of Health & Addiction Services (OhioMHAS), and 8 county commissioner appointees. Pickaway County's appointees are Jack Clark, which serves as board chair, and Bill Archer.

Mrs. Dehner first stated that with the resignation of the former director, she is currently serving in the capacity of the ADAMH Board's Acting Director until a new director is hired, and the advertisement for the position will be appearing in the local newspaper. She distributed and reviewed information about the several reasons the ADAMH Board approved going to the voters for the new levy as funding from state and federal sources has not kept pace with the needs our communities face with the opiate epidemic that has long-reaching and long-lasting effects on children and families struggling with addiction. If passed by the voters, the new levy would generate roughly \$4.5 million annually, and the cost to a homeowner on a \$100,000 home would be about \$35 per year. Funds would be used to support a range of mental health and substance abuse services, including crisis, detox, treatment and prevention programming. The proceeds would not only help to pay for client's access to treatment, but also promote prevention in schools. Mrs. Dehner discussed the rippling effects that alcohol and drug addiction also has on other services, such as law enforcement, county jails and prisons, Children Services, Health Departments, and schools.

Statistics related to the increased numbers of individuals needing mental health and addiction services were reviewed along with the decrease in state and federal funding. In FY2016, Mrs. Dehner noted that that the Paint Valley ADAMH Board spent \$7,623,249 in providing various services with only \$2,187,697 received in state and federal funds. She stated that the only reason ADAMH was able to make up the difference was because they had been fugal with the existing levy funds.

.Mrs. Dehner stated that the public value of ADAMH Boards is to access he needs of the communities they serve related to mental health and addiction treatment and prevention services; plan how to meet the needs of its communities; fund and promote local support and/or levies for community care; monitor contract providers through program reviews and audits; and evaluate cost effectiveness, continuity of care and quality.

After reviewing all of the distributed material, which was followed by a brief question and answer session, the commissioners thanked Mrs. Dehner for meeting with them and providing the information.

Meeting Regarding Columbus-Franklin County
Finance Authority Capital Lease Structure/Bond Fund:

Ryan Scribner, P³ Economic Development Director, met with the commissioners along with Jean Carter Ryan, of the Columbus-Franklin County Finance Authority (CFCFA), and Michael DiPerna, owner of DiPerna Economic Development Advisors, in Westerville, Ohio. CFCFA is a public agency designed to facilitate capital investments by the private, non-profit and public sectors in Central Ohio. The CFCFA is a public agency designed to facilitate capital investments by the private, non-profit, and public sectors in Central Ohio. Ms. Ryan met with the commissioners about the matter several weeks ago. Capital Lease Structure/Bond Fund program (also referred to as “port financing”) the CFCFA can offer that forgoes the state and local sales tax imposed on construction materials.

Mr. Scribner began by stating that they were there to follow-up of the meeting in July and talk about the idea of utilizing the CFCFA and the Capital Lease Structure/Bond program to finance economic development projects in Pickaway County, such as the NorthPoint’s 3-phase warehouse project in Harrison Township. This would require the commissioners’ approval since there is no port authority in Pickaway County. The CFCFA would have to enter into a cooperative agreement with the commissioners if they choose to approve the financing program for NorthPoint because it is out of the CFCFA’s jurisdiction. The City of Columbus and Franklin County do not have veto power over the projects CFCFA finances; however, Ms. Ryan had previously stated that she works very closely with both and she would not move forward with a financing a project through the Capital Lease Structure/Bond program they would not be comfortable with.

Essentially, the CFCFA enters into a capital lease agreement for a project, typically with the developer or building owner. For all intents and purposes, CFCFA is the owner of the building for the period of the lease, typically for a period of 5 years, at which time it reverts back to the original owner at a nominal fee (i.e. \$100). Because the CFCFA is considered a public entity and is the owner of the building during the lease period, state and local sales tax can be exempted on the purchase of construction materials, providing a substantial savings to the client. Ms. Carter mentioned a warehouse project in Groveport that NorthPoint utilized the Capital Lease Structure/Bond Fund program and reinvested a large portion of the sales tax savings into the project’s infrastructure cost. When the question was raised as to how many projects that the CFCFA has financed use this form of financing, Ms. Carter stated currently 30% to 40%.

Ms. Carter stated that the CFCFA exclusively utilizes Mr. DiPerna's firm, established almost 6 years ago, as its financial advisor who then provided a brief background about himself and his firm. He said he has been in economic development financing for nearly 30 years. He was previously with the Robert W. Baird Co., and McDonald Investments before it was sold to KeyCorp in 1998. He started working with the Toledo Port Authority and the Ohio Department of Development in 1988, and created investment vehicles to do projects in the capital market. In 1995, when Owens Corning was building its corporate headquarters the Toledo Port Authority held the asset and leased it to Owens Corning. With the Toledo Port Authority being a political subdivision of the State, it has the right to be exempt from sales tax for construction materials, and Mr. DiPerna stated that they "stumbled" on this technique that could be used and has helped approximately 50 projects to occur across Ohio. Mr. DiPerna stated that while it should be used strategically, the technique is no different than any other incentive technique that makes projects more viable. The sales tax savings can be put back into those projects or other purposes and he provided an example of where a casino was built in Dayton with financing through the Dayton Port and the company was charged with paying off delinquent taxes on the property that was owed to the school system with the sales tax savings.

When the question was raised about whether real property estate taxes are paid during the lease period, it was stated that the holding of title during does not exempt real property taxes. It was also stated that the state and local jurisdiction in which the construction materials are purchased forgoes the sales tax, not the resident county of the project as was mentioned in the prior meeting Ms. Carter had with the commissioners.

It is estimated that NorthPoint's 3-phase warehouse project would provide a sales tax savings of approximately \$2.1 million for all phases. Some portion of this savings would be paid to CFCFA as a fee, to the county, and possibly P³. The fee to the county would essentially be unrestricted in the way it could be expended.

Mr. Scribner stated that the Capital Lease Structure/Bond Fund financing program that NorthPoint would like to take advantage of is consistent with the land use planning consistent with the development planning in the area. The question was then raised on whether the Columbus Regional Airport Authority (CRAA) utilizes this financing program for the projects that Duke Realty develops on its behalf, Mr. Scribner stated that was something he is attempting to explore.

With time becoming a critical factor for NorthPoint's project, Mr. Scribner stated that he will coordinate a meeting for their representatives to meet with the commissioners within the next few weeks along with Ms. Carter to see what NorthPoint is facing as far as its project costs, what the negotiable fees would be for the county and P³, and come up with an agreement that all would be comfortable in signing.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the commissioners thanked Ms. Carter and Mr. DiPerna for meeting with them.

Mr. Scribner remained behind and informed the commissioners that with NTE Energy's intention to develop an electric generation and transmission facility in Pickaway Township, they reached out to the Logan Elm School District's Treasurer and scheduled a meeting for Thursday, September 15th, regarding a compensation agreement related to a 100%, 15-year tax incentive agreement the company intends to apply for. It was noted that if NTE were to apply for a 60%, 10-year tax incentive agreement, it would not require the approval of the school district and the commissioners could move forward with approving the agreement without the school board's consent.

In discussing the matter, it was determined that Commissioner Henson will attend the meeting as an interested party on the county's behalf; however, it will be stated that the commissioners want the other taxing authorities to also receive their same ratio of exempted real estate taxes as well.
